

ELWYN.



To those who know it, the name Elwyn resonates with themes such as **care**, **quality** and **history**.

Early in its nearly 160-year history, Elwyn garnered national and international prominence for its groundbreaking role in defining and refining the field of intellectual disabilities. Historically, Elwyn was among the forerunners in its field. From



its roots as a Philadelphia school providing some of the nation's first educational opportunities for people with developmental challenges, Elwyn has emerged as a significant community resource -- continually adjusting to meet the needs of the individuals it serves. Elwyn is a capable, formidable organization often seated at the verge of breakthroughs and continuously on



Elwyn once existed primarily as a local resource, serving only Media and the Greater Philadelphia area.

TODAY, Elwyn's impact is much more expansive, reaching into the neighboring areas of the Lehigh Valley, Delaware and New Jersey, and extending into Florida and California.

Elwyn has built a network of strong partnerships with families, donors, local businesses, school districts, universities, legislators and professional organizations. This group is dedicated to Elwyn's mission and shares its commitment to improve the quality of life for individuals.

TIMELINE

1852

James Richards arrived in Philadelphia and opened a classroom for children with intellectual disabilities. A year later Dr. Elwyn agreed to support James Richards' efforts and influenced By a special act of the Pennsylvania Legislature incorporating, "The Pennsylvania Training School for Feeble-Minded Children".

1859

The building was completed. On September 1, the entire school, 25 children, staff, and furniture were loaded onto two Conestoga wagons for the journey to the new school. Two vears later the Civil War leaves the school with decreased revenue and all "officers of the house and teachers" agree to a 50% pay cut.



1921

Standardized testing, including the Vineland Social Maturity Scale, was implemented on all children admitted to Elwvn. This scale was developed at The Training School at Vineland, New Jersey, which would later become a subsidiary of Elwyn.



1981

Ground was broken for the National Center for **Rehabilitation and Independent** Living in West Philadelphia. This building would become the new home for Philadelphia Elwyn. Elwyn also assumed management of The Training School at Vineland, New Jersev.



1857

At the invitation of the trustees, Dorthea L. Dix came to Philadelphia to see the work being done with the children. She then spoke before the Pennsylvania legislature and obtained a grant for the construction of a new, larger school. A sixty-acre farm near Media, Pennsylvania was chosen and purchased for \$10,000.

1876

The first professional organization totally devoted to the study of intellectual disabilities and what was to become the current American Association of Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities is founded at Elwyn.

1960

Dr. Gerald R. Clark becomes superintendent and during his tenure makes major changes to the Kerlin/Barr Model. Campus services are opened to the community and Elwyn begins new community based vocational, residential and educational services for people with intellectual disabilities.

1974

California Elwyn was founded in Fountain Valley, California and Delaware Elwyn was founded in Wilmington as community based vocational/rehab facilities.



1991

Sandra S. Cornelius, Ph.D was appointed the eighth President of Elwyn. Under her leadership, Elwyn broadens its mission to include enabling people to meet their individual challenges whether they are intellectual, behavioral or physical. Programs are begun and expanded for children and adults with significant behavioral health needs

Elwyn has an accomplished past, with the proven ability to face the challenges of changing societal and fiscal landscapes with the support of its partners. Elwyn began as a community resource, the Pennsylvania Training School, in a neighborhood on Philadelphia's Germantown Avenue; the campus was built in response to the growing number of people with special needs, who after a certain age were no longer supported by the state, and therefore had no place to go. Over the years, Elwyn has successfully reinvented itself in response to individual needs and societal changes. Through these changes Elwyn has maintained its position as one of the premiere private providers of services to people with disabilities. Today, Elwyn provides a full range of quality services to more than 13,000 individuals each year. The organization has a unique approach to serving people with significant challenges and continually fosters new programs to provide individualized service to people with disabilities. The individuals Elwyn serves - no matter what their needs - are given the chance to build confidence, maximize their potential, and find a compassionate, supportive atmosphere. Elwyn goes the inspiring extra mile to deliver the individualized services that make Elwyn extraordinary.

Service Areas

EACH ELWYN SERVICE AREA ADDRESSES A DIFFERENT NEED:

>> Work & Adult Day Services Addresses active employment, social development, and skill acquisition, in terms of daily living, social and recreational and personal care.

>> Education

Provides students requiring special education services and students at-risk of school failure with individualized academic, therapeutic and functional behavioral supports to meet the goal of independent living and participation in their home communities. Services are provided in campus-based programs and in community-based programs in school districts, charter schools and non-public schools. The Early Childhood Division comprises two major programs: The Development Center and Special Education for Early Developmental Success (SEEDS).

> Research and Health Services

Addresses the health care needs of people with disabilities, providing genetic, dental, medical, nursing, nutrition, physical rehabilitation, audiological, therapeutic recreational, psychological and pharmacy services as well as on-going research in the field of intellectual disabilities.

>> Supports for Living

Provides services to individuals with intellectual and/or developmental disabilities in a variety of residential settings and service programs. These services promote individualized health care, social development, recreation, community integration and other aspects of daily living to maximize growth and independence.

- >> Behavioral Health Services Serves individuals with autism, as well as their families and communities at The Autism Resource Community Hub (ARCH) of Lehigh Valley.
- >> Elwyn NC (Northern California) Provides state-of-the-art residential and day services for individuals with significant medical and behavioral issues.
- >> Elwyn New Jersey Focuses on populations with intellectual and/or developmental disabilities in the Garden State.

Challenges The challenges facing Elwyn today are daunting.

An economic climate unlike any since the Great Depression has caused governments at all levels to slash budgets and reconsider support that once was recession-proof For Elwyn this challenging environment invites a renewal of effort and a reinvestment in the entrepreneurial spirit which has long been its hallmark.

Elwyn's presence in the community is of critical importance. The need for services for individuals diagnosed with intellectual, behavioral and developmental challenges, including autism, continues to rise. If unable to solidify sustainability of Elwyn's programs and its subsidiaries, families would no longer have access to quality supports for their loved ones. Individuals in need of Elwyn's support would go without services and/or be forced to look for support elsewhere in a market where fewer and fewer providers are able to survive. Such consequences are unthinkable and unacceptable.

To meet these challenges, Elwyn must continue to be the provider of choice and more fully expose its competitive edge. It must seek to expand and invigorate healthy and collaborative relationships with families, communities, and government entities. The continued identification of new opportunities and coordination of those opportunities must expand across the organization. To remain a leader in its field, Elwyn must address funding cuts with alternate sources of revenue, meet capital needs and improvements, fund more pilot and transitional programs, significantly increase endowment and maintain high levels of innovation.

Sheer size and diversification allow Elwyn the flexibility to shape and alter services with an ease that eludes other agencies. A wide range of programs, coupled with dental, audiological, pharmacy and genetic services, sets Elwyn apart from its competitors. An outstanding reputation, individualized programming, fiscal prudence, and a diversification of funding has enabled Elwyn to expand its services over the years.
